A RESOLUTION

Relative to the boundary dispute between Georgia and Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area; and for other purposes.

WHEREAS, the existing boundary line between Georgia and Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area, has been recognized as such for many years; and

WHEREAS, the current controversy regarding the boundary line between Georgia and Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area, serves no useful purpose whatsoever; and

WHEREAS, it would be unfair to both Georgia and Tennessee and to the respective citizens thereof to presume to change the boundary line between the two States, in the Chattanooga area, when the line is firmly established by tradition.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES that the members of this body do hereby go on record as approving the boundary line currently recognized as such between the State of Georgia and the State of Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Clerk of the House of Representatives is hereby authorized and directed to transmit an appropriate copy of this Resolution to Honorable Winfield Dunn, Governor of the State of Tennessee, Honorable James R. McKinney, Speaker of the House of Representatives, and to Honorable John S. Wilder, Speaker of the Senate.

On the adoption of the Resolution, the roll call was ordered and the vote was as follows:
