CHAPTER 269.

AN ACT entitled an Act to establish the line between Georgia and Tennessee, to provide for the appointment of competent men to establish said line, and to appropriate funds to defray expenses for same.

WHEREAS, There are grave doubts as to the loca- State line.
tion of the State line between Georgia and Tennessee, on that part of the line between Dade County, Georgia, and Marion and Hamilton Counties, Tennessee, creating trouble and inconvenience between the citizens of the two States; therefore,

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of* Governor to communicate.
the State of Tennessee, That the Governor of this State shall be empowered to communicate with the Governor of Georgia for the purpose of having a joint survey looking to the settlement of the question in dispute.

SEC. 2. *Be it further enacted*, That the Governor Survey.
of Tennessee, after such communication with the Governor of Georgia as is necessary, shall be empowered to appoint three competent men to act with such members as may be appointed by the Governor of Georgia, whose duty it shall be to survey, estab-

lish, and proclaim the true line between the disputed points.

Appropriation
for expenses.

SEC. 3. *Be it further enacted*, That not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars be and the same is hereby appropriated to pay expenses of said proceeding, for which the Governor of Tennessee may draw his warrant on the Comptroller.

Where survey
shall begin.

SEC. 4. *Be it further enacted*, That the joint Commission so appointed by the Governors of Tennessee and Georgia shall begin their survey at that point where Georgia and Alabama corner, and run east as far as is necessary to establish the disputed line.

Conflicting laws
repealed.

SEC. 5. *Be it further enacted*, That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act be and the same are hereby repealed, and that this Act take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

CHAPTER 499.

SENATE BILL NO. 513.

AN ACT to provide for establishing the line between the State of Georgia and Tennessee; to provide for the appointment of a Commission to establish said line; and to appropriate money to pay the expenses thereof.

WHEREAS, There are grave doubts as to the location of the State line between Georgia and Tennessee on that part of the line which runs between Dade County in the State of Georgia and Marion and Hamilton Counties in the State of Tennessee; and,

WHEREAS, The same has occasioned considerable trouble, and said line should be definitely settled and fixed.

SECTION 1. *Be it enacted by the General Assembly of the State of Tennessee,* That the Governor of this State is hereby directed to communicate with the Governor of the State of Georgia for the purpose of having a joint survey and settlement of the disputed question; and if an arrangement can be made between the Governors of the two States, then the Governor of the State of Tennessee be, and he is hereby, authorized and required to appoint three competent persons to act with such member as may be appointed by the State of Georgia, whose duty it shall be to survey and establish and proclaim the true line between the disputed points.

SEC. 2. *Be it further enacted,* That the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars, or so much thereof as may be necessary, be, and the same is hereby, appropriated to pay the expenses of said proceeding, for which the Governor may draw his warrant on the Treasurer of the State.

SEC. 3. *Be it further enacted,* That all laws and parts of laws in conflict with this Act be, and the same are hereby, repealed.

SEC. 4. *Be it further enacted,* That this Act take effect from and after its passage, the public welfare requiring it.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 462

A RESOLUTION to proclaim that the Eighty-Seventh General Assembly of the State of Tennessee approves the existing boundary line between Tennessee and Georgia.

WHEREAS, the existing boundary line between Georgia and Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area, has been recognized as such for many years; and

WHEREAS, the current controversy regarding the

boundary line between Georgia and Tennessee, in the Chattanooga area, serves no useful purpose whatsoever; and

WHEREAS, it would be unfair to both Georgia and Tennessee and to the respective citizens thereof to presume to change the boundary line between the two states, in the Chattanooga area, when the line is firmly established by tradition; and

WHEREAS, the House of Representatives of the State of Georgia adopted a Resolution on March 8, 1972, approving the boundary line currently recognized as such between the State of Georgia and the State of Tennessee; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES OF THE EIGHTY-SEVENTH GENERAL ASSEMBLY OF THE STATE OF TENNESSEE, THE SENATE CONCURRING, That the members of this General Assembly do hereby go on record as approving the boundary line currently recognized as such between the state of Georgia and the State of Tennessee.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Clerk of the House of Representatives is hereby authorized and directed to transmit an appropriate copy of this Resolution to the Honorable Jimmy Carter, Governor of the State of Georgia; the Honorable Lester M. Maddox, President of the Senate of Georgia; and the Honorable George L. Smith, Speaker of the House Representatives of the State of Georgia.
